Queen Cartimandua of the Brigantes is the first queen in British history to play a determining part in a policy for the whole island She does not hold the stage with the outraged fury of Boudicca: no description of her appearance, terrifying or otherwise, has come down to us But until the moment when the neglectful terms of a husband's will

CHRIS RUDD How a strong pony became a strong ruler

Cartimandua ("Strong Pony"), queen of the Brigantes, and the letters VE were thought to refer to her husband Venutius I say "not surprisingly" because Cartimandua was well known to classical historians as the queen who surrendered the British freedom-fighter Caratacus to the Romans in AD 51

The Brigantes: From Clientage to Conquest By WS HANSON and DB CAMPBELL T is generally assumed that the Brigantes under Queen Cartimandua had been formally recognised as Roman allies at some stage not long after the Roman invasion, though nowhere does Tacitus or any other ancient author make a direct statement to that effect

Brigantes Queen Cartimandua was the leader of the Brigantia tribe She was pro-Roman and was probably one of the original leaders to surrender to

Claudius In AD 51 she even refused refuge to Caratacus, a Celtic guerrilla leader fleeing from the Romans after fighting on the Welsh

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Cartimandua was queen of the Brigantes who controlled most of the North of England She quickly realised that the Romans were too powerful and was one of eleven rulers who surrendered without a fight Unlike her more famous counterpart, Boudicca, in the east, Cartimandua decided to work with, rather than against, the Romans

Initial contact between Rome and the Brigantes was probably made soon after the first landing of the invading army in AD 43 By AD 47 Roman troops led by the Governor Plautius had come to a halt on the line of the Fosse Way As we know from the Roman author Tacitus that Cartimandua, the queen of the Brigantes at that time, was friendly to Rome
